Walt Arfons - 1916 - 2013 *Bryce*

Walt Arfons, who with his half-brother Art, introduced jet-powered dragsters to the sport, passed away on June 4th. The pair began building some of the fastest racecars of their time, cobbling together old car and truck parts with aircraft engines in garages at their family's feed mill and hardware store in Akron. Their jet-powered cars were setting world speed records at Bonneville in the early '60s. A rivalry between the brothers developed soon. Walt's Goodyear-sponsored "Wingfoot express" clocked 413.2 at Bonneville on October 2, 1964, followed 3 days later by Art's Firestone-sponsored car reaching 434.3. Only about a week after that, Craig Breedlove's "Spirit of America" eclipsed that, and Art and Craig proceeded to continue breaking each other's records. Walt went on to build the first rocket-propelled car, but concluded that it was probably too heavy due to extensive safty equipment he has installed. One of his grandsons recalled visiting Walt's shop in the early days – "he took stuff out of junkyards and made racecars". "He liked to say 'There's nothing like sitting in a car and feeling the afterburners".

STILLWATER GARAGE RUN: Dan Burrows

NEW JERSEY STATE POLICE TICKETING Frank Carey

Here's the latest NJ State Police Initiative (Radio Station 101.5 confirmed this info). Starting July 28, New Jersey will launch a 30-day speeding ticket frenzy. The state estimates that 9 million dollars will be generated in speeding tickets. One million dollars will go to pay state troopers over-time. There will be 50 state troopers on duty at all times patrolling the 9 main intersections and highways as follows:

- I-295 North and South,
- I-95 Jersey Turnpike North and South,
- I-80 East and West.
- I-287 North and South,
- I-78 East and West,I-195 East and West.
- I-280 East and West,
- Route 130 North and South,
- Garden State Parkway North and South

5 MPH above the limit can justify a ticket . They have issued 30 brand new unmarked Crown Victoria cruisers and are bringing in all of their part-timers on full time. If you work in NJ, NY, DE or CT, you will probably be on one of these highways. So, please be on guard and drive safely! Starting August 15, the price of a violation to show your driver's license, registration or insurance card at the time you are stopped, increased from \$44.00 to \$173.00. (Keep these documents in your car). And the fine for not having all three documents is \$519.00! The fine for hand-held cell phone use while driving will be going up to \$180.00.

BATTERIES Frank Carey

The current issue of *Street Rodder* (August 2013) has a very good article on batteries that you should all read. There's a good explanation of the differences between a regular battery and one of the sealed kind that looks like a 6-pack. Also interesting was an explanation of what goes wrong when a battery is overcharged. An overcharging battery will give off explosive hydrogen. In a regular battery this gas escapes through the vented cell caps. But this problem caused by overcharging is easily remedied by adding water to each cell. But a sealed battery does not have vents. If it is overcharged it will expel the gas through a safety relief valve. Once this happens there is no practical way to add water and premature battery failure will result. So, whatever you do, don't overcharge your sealed battery.

The article also explains a "safety feature" in our battery chargers. Today's chargers won't charge if it senses low resistance which could be caused by a short or a bad cell. But the measured resistance of a sealed battery is different and if the charge drops below 10.5 volts the resistance will have dropped to the point where your battery charger will think something is wrong and won't charge it. There doesn't seem to be a good solution to this problem. Some years ago I discovered that my really, really dead conventional battery couldn't be charged with my super duper whiz bang NAPA charger. I suspected there was some kind of safety "feature" preventing charging and this *Street Rodder* story makes me think I was probably right. I don't remember what I did at the time but I eventually discovered a solution to this problem. I bought a 1950s era battery charger at a swap meet for \$2.00. It does not have the "safety feature" and will charge any really dead battery. But you probably don't want to use one of these very old chargers on your sealed battery and risk overcharging it. If you decide to try it anyway you had better watch it very closely.

VINTAGE STREET RODDERS OF AMERICA (VSRA) Frank Carey

I've written about these guys before. They are a pre-1948 street rod group that was created in response to NSRA raising the cut-off date for cars and they are very good at what they do.

They're holding their Fourth Annual Thunder Road Rod Run on September 27 - 28 at the Appalachian Fairgrounds in Grey, Tennessee. This is in the Johnson City area of eastern Tennessee. They are having a Friday evening cookout at the East Tennessee Distillery in nearby Piney Flats, Tennessee, and that sounds interesting to say the least. This must be bourbon country.

I mention this VSRA event because there was a time when a contingent of North Jersey SRA guys would travel together to such places as the NSRA Nationals in the mid-west, to NSRA events in Burlington and York, and to other out-of state events such as Syracuse and Rhinebeck. And several of us once went to the Run to the Sun in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. So if any of you are still interested in travelling to a good out-of- state event, I predict you'll have a good time if you go to this one. I go to the annual VSRA event in Florida every year and this is a great group of people.
